



ON THE ESTATE OF CASTLESEMPLE - TO BE LET



<u>COAL</u>.—The Coal, so far as has hitherto been proved, is found to be of good quality. The field supposed to stretch along the line of the Ayrshire Railway, and to turn round in a semicircular form by the village of Lochwinnoch, near the Parish Church, at the western extremity of the lake. From the vicinity of so many extensive ironworks and manufactories, as well as from the local wants of the district, and the immediate vicinity of the populous village of Lochwinnoch, Coal is in great request.

<u>LIMESTONE.</u>—The Carboniferous Limestone has been found on various points of the property, and is supposed to be of good quality and easily workable. As usual, it is found under the coal beds. It is in good demand in the district.



On Sunday a conveyance, with two ladies and three gentlemen from Lochwinnoch, was upset near Garruth. One of the ladies fainted with the shock, the whole party being thrown out. 1874 Licensing Courts

Mr James Swan, of Wattieston, said that in Lochwinnoch parish there were no fewer than three hotel licenses, which were far too many. On Sunday the scenes of drinking were disgraceful, and it was dangerous for travellers on the road between Kilbirnie and Lochwinnoch to walk in that direct:on because of drunken people. He would give the hotel-keepers notice that next year the granting of these licenses would be opposed.

I<u>RONSTONE.</u>—The Ironstones are both of the Clay-Ironstone and Blackbands species, but sufficient trials have not been made to ascertain their value. It is probable, however, from the strata being in the immediate neighbourhood of the well known Ayrshire Blackband Ironstone, and lying in the same direction, that they may turn out on further trials to be valuable.

<u>COPPER ORES</u>.—These are supposed to be of excellent quality. Some works have already been commenced in the neighbourhood, and it is understood that the veins of Copper which have been found in the adjoining property of Kaim are continued into the Castlesemple Estate, where the lands of High Barnaigh (part of the Castlesemple Estate) adjoin to Kaim. The greater part of the Ore which has been hitherto found is understood to shew from fifty to sixty per cent, of Copper.

The Castlesemple Estates are situated about fifteen miles west from Glasgow, and eight from Paisley, and surround the town of Lochwinnoch, where there is a station of the Ayrshire Railway

NATIONAL PETITION 1838
